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Launch of Caritas Plymouth

Bishop Mark O'Toole welcomed 104 attendees and speakers from across England to the Launch of Caritas Plymouth on Saturday 18 May. Caritas Plymouth has been established to exercise the Ministry of Charity across the diocese.

All the Catholic charities, parishes and schools have been involved in the development of a Strategic Plan for Caritas Plymouth. One of the first priorities is Community Sponsorship and Caritas Plymouth was delighted to welcome Sean Ryan, the national Catholic Co-ordinator based at Caritas Salford. Phil McCarthy, Chief Executive of the national Caritas Social Action Network, welcomed Caritas Plymouth to the Caritas family.

Angela Folland, Headteacher of St Nicholas Catholic Primary School where the event was held, gave examples of the school's social action and how Caritas Plymouth could help and support this activity in schools in the future.

Community Sponsorship

This scheme opens a path for people to respond with compassion, providing welcome and integration and should be taken up as widely as possible.”

The first Catholic Community Sponsorship Group, in the Sidmouth parish, has started work on their Home Office application to welcome a family to Sidmouth.

Community groups need to raise £9,000 for the immediate needs of their family and to find accommodation for them for at least the first two years. They are also responsible for helping the family access medical services, schools, welfare benefits and translators.



Caritas Plymouth will be the Lead Sponsor and responsible for policies such as Safeguarding and Complaints for all parishes and schools interested in applying. There are various resources available. Please contact caritas@prcdtr.org.uk for more information.

Mini Vinnies project

The St Vincent de Paul Society, SVP, is a Catholic lay organisation which in the spirit of justice and charity helps those suffering from poverty in whatever form.

Works include visiting the lonely, elderly and isolated, soup runs, food banks, giving grants to those in need, debt counselling and assisting refugees and asylum seekers.

There are four age categories of Youth SVP, and during the next twelve months our Plymouth Central Council SVP will be engaged in a project to increase the number of Mini Vinnies, small organised groups of children in our Catholic primary schools, who will be doing good deeds suitable for their age.

We take with us newspapers, prayer cards and confectionary which are received with gratitude. We continue to maintain the seafarer's room in Teignmouth and Plymouth.

These rooms are vital to the seafarers as they can access the internet and talk to their loved ones, as well as relax away from their vessel for a short while. The weekend of July 13th/14th is Sea Sunday. During mass we remember all seafarers and the hard life they endure in order to bring us 95% of our goods.

On July 3rd Hannah Forrest (Ship visitor Plymouth) received the overall youth award "Pope Francis Award" for her voluntary work with AoS. This award was presented to her by Cardinal Vincent Nichols.

'Laudato Si', mi Signore'

Praised be to you my Lord (Canticle of St Francis)

On the 29th June 2019, a group of people from the Dorset Deanery came together to review the message of the Encyclical Letter entitled "Laudato Si", published in May 2015 by Pope Francis. No one who has seen the Blue Planet can be in any doubt of the risks our planet is in and the option of doing nothing is not available to us.

We heard from Ellen Teague, Writer, Activist and Media Desk person for the Columbans, who has written on this topic extensively and has travelled to places where the climate crisis will have its first permanent impact beyond strangely variable weather.

David Wells presented concisely on the Pope's suggested - See, Judge, Act - Celebrate - and those present considered with suggestions from Ellen what they might do in their parishes to begin to make a contribution to dealing with the situation.


The urgency denoted by the word 'crisis' demanded action and action now - by individuals, parishes, communities, towns, cities and countries. No one was exempt.

St Petrocs launch a book of poems by clients, volunteers and staff.

St Petrocs' work in Cornwall to assist the homeless continues. As fast as they re-house people, more people flow on to the streets behind them. Last year they were involved in re-housing 581 people. The number of people sleeping rough on a typical night in Cornwall was reduced from 68 to 53.



Every client has different needs and aspirations, so they reflect this in their services by having a wide variety of opportunities. Last winter they offered clients, staff and volunteers the chance to take part in a series of poetry workshops and a poetry competition. The response was so positive that they have published a book containing some of the work entitled "Stones in Our Hands".

The book was launched at the Royal Cornwall Show on the 6th June where readings of some of the poems were delivered by clients, staff, board members and funders of the project, to a moved audience. Copies of the book are available through their website.

They remain committed to offering those who have been forced to sleep rough, good quality services where they are not only safe, but also given the opportunity to prosper.

Vicki Dunstone is our new Fundraiser and Communications Officer replacing Claire Warren, who for the last 8 years did a wonderful job raising funds and increasing the charity's profile across the diocese. Having worked in a local CAST school for the last 6 years and with a wealth of marketing and fundraising experience, Vicki is looking forward to continuing the great work undertaken by her predecessor, and to finding innovative and fun ways such as linking with our schools in the diocese to help raise much needed funds for the charity.

Vicki joins Lydia Keogh, who is responsible for our Grant Essentials Programme to relieve the urgent material needs of children, young people and families through the provision of financial assistance to those in dire need. Last year, CCSP raised £50,000 and was able to provide over £33,000 in grant funding and we hope to be able to support even more families over the next couple of years. One in five children living in the South West are living in poverty and in some areas of the region, poverty is even more severe. Many parents and carers, despite working, find their income does not meet their basic needs such as providing a working cooker, warm clothes in the winter or a proper bed to sleep in. And then when circumstances change suddenly, life can become even harder as they have no cushion of savings to fall back on.

We deliberate long and hard over each application we receive and for every grant we are able to approve, we do have to turn away about the same number too. We would love to be able to do more fundraising every year and increase the financial support and generosity we already receive so that we can assist more families in time of great financial need.

"We can not thank you enough!" is a common theme of feedback we receive from those parents and carers we have been able to support.

Vicki and Lydia will be working alongside Caroline Hambly, who has been providing our Patchwork Parenting programme throughout the diocese for the last 5 years, supporting over 60 families in 2018.

Summary of Grants provided in 2018

- 21 washing machines
- 22 cookers
- 20 fridge freezers
- 25 beds and mattresses
- 25 grants for essential furniture such as tables and chairs
- 59 grants for school uniform/shoes
- 13 grants for new baby equipment
- 8 grants for educational purposes (residential, courses and books)
- 3 grants for pilgrims going to Lourdes
