Walking with the Poor

The next World Day of the Poor will be on Sunday 14 November 2021. Caritas organised a Diocesan event on 9 October to prepare for this important date in the calendar and to reflect on this year's <u>message</u> <u>from Pope Francis</u>. You can read more about that event on page 2 of the newsletter.

This year's message is an important one which reflects a fundamental element of the work of Caritas—there is an *'inseparable link between Jesus, the poor and the proclamation of the Gospel. The face of God revealed by Jesus is that of a Father concerned for and close to the poor.'* Jesus teaches us that poverty is a concrete sign pointing to his presence among us and that we can see him in the lives of the poor, in their sufferings and needs.

It is easy to see the poor as different to us - people "outside" our communities. We can slip into a practice of charity or *Caritas* as a relationship between giver and a receiver, with the poor as beneficiaries of our generosity. Pope Francis challenges us to see *Caritas* as an opportunity for mutual sharing and fraternity; '*as a way to strengthen solidarity and lay the necessary foundations for achieving justice and peace.* 'The poor are a sacrament of Christ; they represent his person and point to him. Unless we choose to become poor in passing riches, worldly power and vanity, we will never be able to give our lives in love; we will live a fragmented existence, full of good intentions but ineffective for transforming the world'.

We are challenged this year to think of a *different approach to poverty* and to look for new social models capable of countering the new forms of poverty that are now sweeping the world. We are challenged to look outward, to '*be open to reading the signs of the times that ask us to find new ways of being evangelizers in the contemporary world*'. In our immediate reactions and responses to the needs of the poor we must not overlook the need to look for new ways to show our Christian love and charity to reflect the new forms of poverty experienced by humanity today.

The poor won't come knocking on our door; we need to reach out in our communities 'to understand how they feel, what they are experiencing and what their hearts desire.'

WORLD DAY OF THE POOR 2021


"The poor you will always have with you" (Mk 14:7)



On 9 October over 50 people came together to pray and reflect on this years Papal message for World Day of the Poor. Bishop Mark remarked that 'the grace of God is truly at work in the hearts of all those who, without fanfare, spend themselves for the poorest, sharing with them in concrete ways'. Raymond Friel, CEO of Caritas Social Action Network reminded us of the words of Pope Francis that "*Christ's Gospel summons us to display special concern for the poor and to recognize the varied and excessive forms of moral and social disorder that are generating ever new forms of poverty.*" Catholic Social Teaching offers us an opportunity to see what is happening in our local and global communities, to judge and then to act.

In the afternoon, participants were invited to reflect on the needs in their own communities and parishes and what action we might take to address those needs. Their reflections and comments will feed into a review of Caritas Plymouth's strategy for 2022.



TACKLING POVERTY

'For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink' Matthew 25:321

In the first half of 2021, *Caritas Plymouth* distributed over £40,000 as food vouchers and essential grants in partnership with the Catholic Children's Society (Plymouth). The funding was a generous donation from the Albert Gubay Charitable Foundation. The funding was distributed as direct grants to individual families, through food vouchers or food parcels distributed by schools and other partners and through provision of meals. To reach those in need, *Caritas Plymouth* worked with 19 partners including St Vincent de Paul groups, parishes, small local organisations providing community food support and primary schools. We reached 326 families and 1900 individuals.

'I just wanted to share our appreciation for the supermarket vouchers... they have been a huge help to our family especially when there are seven of us. During the lockdown periods my husband was off work... and we were worrying about paying our rent, putting food on the table, milk for the babies, nappies etc... thanks once again.'

'It has provided the much-needed food and essentials to struggling families and taken away the stress of parents not being able to feed their children. It has also strengthened our parish family during these difficult times '

Environmental Activity Across the Diocese

On 17 July, Caritas Plymouth held an event, chaired by Canon John Deeny, to promote reflection, prayer and discussion about the Diocesan <u>environmental policy</u>. We were delighted to be joined by Bishop Mark O'Toole; Sister Margaret Atkins, a Canoness of St Augustine in the community at Boarbank Hall, Cumbria and Francis Stewart from the CAFOD theology team. Over 50 people from across the Diocese joined the event.



Bishop Mark O'Toole opened the event referring to Chapter 3 of St Mark's Gospel and what sits at the heart of our environmental policy: that whatever the Church does, She is seeking to gather people close to the Lord to respond to the apostolic invitation to be close to Him; in being close to Him, He encourages and mandates His followers to go forth. This is an important twofold dynamic of our environmental policy: it is very important that we take time to pray and study the scriptures to come close to the Lord and out of that, we then embark on action. 'Rather than a problem to be solved the world is a joyful mystery to be contemplated with gladness and praise'. (Laudato Si') The full recording of Bishop Mark's introduction is <u>here</u>.

Sr Margaret Atkins reminded us that the cry of the earth and cry of the poor are interconnected and something that should be integrated into every aspect of life. Being environmentally aware is central for us, but because of our faith it has a much deeper connection and the interconnectedness is part of that deeper dimension. The goodness in creation calls out our gratitude; the wisdom and understanding we find in creation calls out our humility and the wonder of life calls out our generosity.

So what can we do?

It can be easy to feel pessimistic in the face of negative messages about the state of the environment but Sister Margaret stressed the importance of hope and an understanding that every action is important—not matter how small. The global Climate Conference in Glasgow in November could offer a turning point and we are all asked to lobby our MPs and politicians so they know how we feel. There are a number of great campaigns that you can sign up to from home

This will be the eigh year that the Eden Project has hosted an annual Sleep Out and the events have raised thousands of pounds for two charities, St Petrocs and the Amber Foundation.

We cannot fail to have been aware of the plight of refugees and migrants through pictures of people arriving in small boats on our shores and images of those fleeing the conflict in Afghanistan. May of us want to help but are not sure what to do.

As people arrive in the UK seeking refuge, there are lots of opportunities for people to get involved such as offering vacant properties and housing for refugees, as well as community and cultural activities, English language support and other options. Donations – specifically baby equipment, clothes and homeware – are also being welcomed in some areas. Councils are leading on resettling families and those who want to help can search their postcode on this website, to find the specific help their council is looking for: https://www.gov.uk/help-refugees

There are many organisations which regularly seek clothing and other material support and you can often find out about them from your local church networks. The following are just a few charities operating in our Diocese:

There is also the opportunity for community sponsorship, which allows parishes to welcome a family. Community sponsors provide housing for the refugees and support them in integrating into life in the UK. They help to arrange access to medical and social services, English language tuition and support towards employment and self-sufficiency. COMMUNITY SPONSORSHIP

It has been seven months since Companions Sidmouth welcomed a Syrian Family to their community as part of the Community Sponsorship scheme. On 23 September the group was joined by Canon John Deeny and Deborah Fisher to reflect on the progress which has been made in supporting the family to settle in the UK.

Companions Sidmouth have taken to heart Pope Francis' call to us all to 'Welcome, Protect, Promote and Integrate' refugees (Fratelli Tutti). The group have helped the family to access health, education and other opportunities as well as providing friendship and encouragement. The relationship has been one of mutual support and companionship. One volunteer commented:



Caritas Plymouth, in partnership with Plymouth CAST Multi-Academy Trust, has started an ambitious 18-month funded project as part of an exciting national initiative known as Care Home Friends and Neighbours: Intergenerational Linking, which promotes young people's engagement with older people living in care homes across England.



Ten primary schools from Plymouth, Devon, Torbay and Dorset have now established links with local care homes and three have already started to make new connections.

Children have already been busy introducing themselves to Care Home Residents sharing artwork and letters.

St Mary's RC Primary in Poole took part in their first intergenerational project with Magna Care Centre in July 2021. They painted rocks for 'Our World Rocks' Project. The school's rocks were shared with the residents who sent photos of the ones they had painted.

JUSTICE AND PEACE

In the last few months it has become more and more obvious ...we are all affected in some way by the Covid pandemic, all seeing the suffering resulting from climate change, all witnessing the outrages of war and watching the flows of migrants and refugees; all in our Diocese affected by the tragic shooting in Plymouth.

On our own we cannot take up all the issues in the work for justice and peace. But we can do more if we work together - leading prayer, reading and campaigning. In our various groups and networks, we can try to weave a web in which the strands of justice and peace are strong and supportive.

Mary Bradley from Falmouth Parish has written about the Falmouth and Penryn Churches Together Justice and Peace group which she set up 8 years ago and which now has 12 members. 'The aim of the group is to raise awareness of current issues of Justice, Peace and persecution, taking small concrete steps to address them. The group meets once a month and shares prayer, good news before focusing on a particular topic or action. The group remembers and prays for Christians and others suffering persecution.' The group makes a real difference. Mary says: 'We believe and hope that our prayer, actions and perseverance bears fruit for our brothers and sisters in need locally, nationally and globally as we fulfil the Mission of Jesus in care for the marginalised and suffering of our world today'.
