Synodal Update for the Diocese of Plymouth

Welcome to the sixth 'Walking Together' Update

The listening phase of our diocesan Synodal Journey has now drawn to a close and we have prepared a synthesis which has been sent through to the Catholic Bishop's Conference of England and Wales (CBCEW) for the next phase of discernment and listening. We would like to thank all those who have participated in or facilitated meetings or sent through individual feedback. The final diocesan synthesis, a foreword by Bishop Mark and appendices are now on the Diocese of Plymouth website <https://www.plymouth-diocese.org.uk/synod/>. We will send some printed copies to parishes in May. The wealth of contributions sent through will continue to be reviewed and shared in the coming months as we reflect in more detail on all the themes raised. Thank you for all your support!

What next?

There will be further discernment by our Bishops leading to the preparation of a synthesis of the contributions from all Dioceses. A meeting with Bishops and diocesan co-contacts on 1 June will offer an opportunity for us to contribute our thoughts on this process. The national synthesis should be completed by early August and will then be sent for discussion at the continental phase. The national synthesis will be published and we will share it widely when it is available.

This is **not the end of our diocesan journey**. Everyone is invited to reflect on their parish discussions and the diocesan synthesis. The Diocese will be putting resources in place to support the continuation of our local journey.

In his foreword, Bishop Mark says that in offering our diocesan synthesis to the national reflection, and in sending it also back to the Diocese for further reflection, prayer and dialogue, there is a need to continuously allow an interplay between the "voice of the people of God" and "the discernment of the pastors".

We are still only at a very early stage of rediscovering this interaction in the Catholic Church. It requires more patience and attentive listening, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, moving forward. But it is important for us to note, at this point, that it is in listening to the people of God that discernment begins.

Some points for reflection in parishes and schools

Whilst waiting for further resources that will be sent in the coming months, Bishop Mark has suggested a number of questions for ongoing reflection and discussion in parishes and schools:

- Does what you see in the synthesis resonate with what you said? What can we take forward at diocesan level?
- To the 85-90% of men and women in the Diocese who seem not to have engaged with our walking together process so far, do you find your voice and your life reflected in what is said here? How can we walk more authentically with one another in our desire to encounter the Risen Lord and to share Him with our brothers and sisters?
- To our clergy - thank you to those who engaged, either in collaboration with the parishioners, or with other clergy, or in direct contributions. What will assist you in taking some of these themes forward more fully in the parish and in our schools, with people of all ages?
- To those clergy who have not yet engaged with this walking together process, what would you want to contribute? What can assist in giving you the confidence and the energy to be more intentionally part of this journey?
